





FROM THE CHAIRMAN



Society for Service to Voluntary Agencies (North) Punjab (SOSVA, for short) works as Mother NGO as well as Field NGO. As a Mother NGO we have interface mainly with the Health and Women & Child Development Departments of the Punjab Government, and act as a link between the Government and field NGOs. We identify suitable NGOs, disburse grants to them (out of funds provided by the Government), monitor their performance, mentor them and provide guidance for implementing projects.

Women empowerment programme is funded by the Women & Child Development Department. It aims to provide six months training to women from poorer sections in 'Computer Applications', 'Cutting & Tailoring', 'Skin & Hair Care' and 'Home Care for Elderly and Critically Sick Persons'. Ninty Nine projects have been implemented during the year. (Eighty out of Govt grant,10 from HPCL Mittal Foundation (CSR Fund) & Nine from donations).94 projects are under implementation from 02.01.2025. (87 from Govt Grant and 7 projects from HPCL -Mittal Foundation CSR grant). Projects implemented have imparted training to 2500 women and those under implementation will impart Training to another 2300 women. in various skills. Feedback from those trained in earlier batches shows that some of them are earning Rs 10,000 or more p.m. while earnings of others are relatively modest. Most importantly, training gives them self-confidence besides, helping them to improve family's financial viability.

We have been implementing Reproductive and Child Health Programme (RCH) since 1999 in association with the Health Department. Initially, the emphasis of this prorgamme was on underserved rural areas. After health infrastructure had expanded with the positioning of ASHAs and ANMs in the entire state, our focus shifted to urban slums for creating awareness about various Government schemes for pregnant and lactating women, adolescent girls, children and the elderly residing in the project area. We aim to raise health infrastructure indicators in these areas to the level of rest of the State. The programme is implemented in close coordination with the local functionaries of Health and Ayurveda Departments and anganwari workers of Women and Child Development Department. During the Year 2024-25, 4 RCH projects out of grant for 2023-24 were implemented. Six RCH Projects & 01 for Home Care For Elderly & Sick Persons are under implementation out of grant 2024-25.

As a Field NGO we have been implementing Punjab State AIDS Control Society (PSACS) projects at Phagwara for injecting Drug Users (IDUs), and for Female Sex Workers and MSMs (Homo sexual males) for creating awareness regarding HIV/ AIDS. As the release of grant was delayed, the

project for remedial coaching of weak students in class 3 could not be implemented during the year.

HPCL-Mittal Foundation which had sanctioned Rs 10.76 lacs during 2023-24 sanctioned a sum of Rs 07 lacs during 2024-25 out of CSR funds. With these funds 10 projects started during 2023-24 were completed during the year. During 2024-25, 7 projects are under implementation.

Brig. Keshav Chandra Member Director donated Rs. 20,000/-to the society.

My esteemed colleagues Shri BB Mahajan, Brig. Keshav Chandra, Dr. GL Goyal, Dr BC Gupta, Dr. Dinesh Kumar Verma, Ms. Mahua Pal, Col RK Bhardwaj, Dr Reena Singh (Member-Directors) and Shri D.S. Grewal, Sh. A.K. Jaitley and Shri Anil Kaushik (Members, Governing Board) have been lending wholehearted support in running the Society.

I take this opportunity to offer my condolence for the sad demise of Sh S.K Verma, member of the Governing Board who had been an active member of this Society since inception.

Our programme managers and support staff have been working with full dedication and complete commitment.

We are grateful to the Government of Punjab - particularly Health & Family Welfare, Social Security (Women and Child Development), Education, Planning and Finance Departments - as well as Punjab State AIDS Control Society for the confidence reposed in us for implementing their programmes. We also express our gratitude to HPCL Mittal Foundation for their support from their CSR funds.

SOCIETY FOR SERVICE TO VOLUNTARY AGENCIES (NORTH) PUNJAB

I ORIGIN

Northern Chapter of the Society for Service to Voluntary Agencies - SOSVA (N)- was started in 1999 by Sh PH Vaishnav (former Chief Secretary, Punjab) catering to the states of Punjab, Haryana and Delhi, and (UT) Chandigarh. In 2002, in accordance with revised guidelines of the Union Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, SOSVA (N) Punjab (catering to Punjab) and SOSVA(N) (catering to Chandigarh and Delhi) were registered as independent societies as SOSVA (N) was implementing RCH Projects sanctioned by this Ministry. SOSVA (N) Punjab works in dual capacity both as a mother NGO and a field NGO.

II. SOSVA AS MOTHER NGO

Concept of Mother NGO: In the Indian Society traditionally lot of welfare activities are undertaken through donations and private charity - all religions, faiths and sects preach this. But for comprehensive and sustained work, Government has also to play a major role. This is where the need was felt for a special type of NGO -a Mother NGO, designed to help both the Government and the voluntary agencies. Government departments, which wish to involve NGOs in implementing their programmes, are keen to know about their reliability, track record and specific areas of interest of these NGOs, before committing grants. Voluntary agencies, on the other hand, need support in terms of information (on projects for which funding is available) and guidance (for project preparation and submission to the funding agencies). This is where a Mother NGO provides requisite service and inputs to the Government departments, as well as to the field NGOs who are recipient of grants.

SOSVA (North) Punjab has been recognized as a Mother NGO by the following:

- (a) Government of Punjab, Department of Social Security, Women and Child Development (for Women and Child Development programmes and Drug Deaddiction).
- (b) Government of Punjab, Department of Health and Family Welfare (for RCH programme).

SOSVA has, over the years, helped in bringing field NGOs and State Government into an active and mutually beneficial relationship. This has given to the Government assured access to reliable field NGOs and an effective monitoring mechanism of their working.

III. FINANCING

Requirement of funds during the year is assessed and conveyed to the Departments of Social

Security for programmes of Women and Child Development and Drug De-addiction; Health & Family Welfare for RCH programmes, and School Education for the programme of free coaching for weak students who in turn, forward these to the Planning Department. Allocations based on the proposals of Planning Department are approved by the Apex Committee headed by the Chief Secretary. Thereafter, sanction of funds in favour of SOSVA is conveyed by the respective departments.

Funds for HIV/AIDS projects are sanctioned by Punjab State AIDS Control Society.

During the year, an effort was made for tapping other sources. HPCL-Mittal Foundation sanctioned an amount of Rs 7 lakhs out of CSR funds. Donation of Rs 20,000 was also received from a Board member.

Selection of NGOs: An advertisement in newspapers inviting applications from NGOs for grant-inaid is issued. Help is also sought from Deputy Commissioners and district level officers of Social Security & Health Departments to identify suitable NGOs which may be able to implement the programme effectively and with dedication. Applications are scrutinized to check their eligibility and track record (in case they are implementing, or have implemented in the past, any projects under SOSVA). Thereafter, their capability for implementation of the projects is appraised by the Chairman or Member Directors along with concerned Programme Managers. After our recommendations are considered and approved by the Sanctioning Committee, which includes representatives of the State Government, sanctions for the projects to be implemented during the year, along with detailed budget and guidelines, are issued to the field NGOs. Detailed instructions are also issued for maintenance of records and accounts.

Monitoring: Monitoring is undertaken through quarterly, half yearly and annual progress reports, in a detailed format prescribed by SOSVA, and field visits by the Chairman/ Member Directors and Programme Managers and through video conferencing. Deficiencies noticed, during the visits or on scrutiny of the periodic progress reports, are conveyed to the NGO and suitable guidance given to improve performance. In case of persistent unsatisfactory performance despite advice/guidance, the project is discontinued.

Release of Grant and its Utilization: The grant is released to the NGOs in tranches. First installment is released on receipt of necessary documents and, in case of NGOs which had implemented a project during the previous year, on receipt also of utilization certificate (UC) and progress report for the projects implemented. Subsequent installments are released after reviewing performance of the projects. UCs are obtained from the NGOs for the funds released for the whole year. These are scrutinized to ensure that expenditure has been incurred in accordance with the sanctioned

budget and, thereafter, a consolidated UC for the entire grant is submitted to the Government.

Coordination with State Agencies: SOSVA takes up with concerned Department issues that may arise during implementation of the projects. With the Department of Social Security the problems of inadequate number of anganwaris in the project area, fitful availability of nutrition (for pregnant women, lactating mothers and children) and delay in disbursement of benefits under Pradhan Mantri Matritva Vandana Yojana to pregnant women and lactating mothers are taken up; with Department of Health & Family Welfare insufficient or non-availability of IFA and calcium tablets (for distribution to pregnant women, lactating mothers and children) and non-availability of Vit. A doses (to children below 6 years age) or non-holding of outreach camps etc. in areas where RCH projects are running are taken up, Director Ayurveda is requested to issue instructions to its field staff to lend support to NGOs for organizing Ayurveda Camps under RCH Programmee.. The Department of School Education is requested to issue instructions to District Education Officers, for extending cooperation to NGOs to hold events regarding awareness against drug addiction in Colleges and Senior Secondary/Secondary Schools in the project area.

Impact assessment

An exercise to assess the impact of the Women's Empowerment projects viz training in Cutting and Tailoring and Skin and Hair Care was undertaken. Information was obtained from NGOs about family background nature of employment, average monthly earnings etc. of women who had received training from them. This was followed up by telephonic conversations of Member Directors with some of these women. It was heartening to note that most of them were utilizing their training for contributing to family income. They are self-employed, working from their homes or from parlours and boutiques which they have opened, or employed in boutiques or beauty parlours mainly in local units. Average earnings ranged from Rs. 3000/- to 8000/- per month. Some of the women were earning even Rs. 10000/- or more per month with highest earnings being in the range of Rs. 25,000/- per month.

Such success stories indicate a robust fulfillment of the primary goal of training which is to provide employment, financial independence and self confidence to women from poor backgrounds and socially backward communities.

Some of the illustrative success stories are as follows:-

1) Mandeep Kaur residing in a village had been trained in Cutting & Tailoring work at Sukh Amrit Society, Kharar. She is working from home. Initially family and friends were her clients but through word-of-mouth publicity she expanded her business and customer base. She stitches clothes and does fabric painting and reported that she has a monthly income of Rs. 25,000/-. She is

proud to be her own boss, pursuing her passion and making a living out of it.

- 2) Simranjeet Kaur was trained in Skin & Hair Care at Society for the Development of Poor and Needy, Kharar, District Mohali. After completing the course, she opened her own beauty parlour in Kharar and now her earnings are in range of Rs. 10,000-15,000. Sometimes, she earns up to Rs. 35,000/- during festivals and marriage season.
- 3) Bandana who took training in Skin and Hair Care from Mahila Kalyan Samiti in Khirzabad district Mohali, opened her own beauty parlour in Khirzabad. She reported that she normally earns Rs 5000-6000 per month. However during the marriage season and festivals she earns upto RS 20,000/.
- 4) Shubh Devi who had migrated from UP was trained in Cutting & Tailoring from Manashray Foundation, Mohali and lived in one of the slums on the periphery of Chandigarh. As there was no steady income of her husband so she enrolled in tailoring course although she had never used a sewing machine and had studied upto 5th class. After finishing her training and using the sewing machine she got from the NGO, she started stitching clothes and was earning about Rs 8000 or more. However, in the beginning of this year she went back to her village and started stitching clothes in her village and from her savings she bought two more sewing machines and also started teaching stitching to two girls from her village who assist her in work. She mentioned that there is lot of demand in the village as there is no tailor nearby and now she earns between Rs 10,000 to 12,000 per month, out of which she gives Rs 2000 each to the girls. During the wedding season her earnings are more than Rs 15.000/.
- Also worthy of special mention are Sandeep Rani & Navjot Kaur, who received training in Mehr Baba Charitable Trust, District Fatehgarh Sahib. Both are working as instructors at Gurudwara Ganduan Kalan. Sandeep Rani is an embroidery instructor & earns Rs 10000 as instructor. She has also opened Sahib boutique in Bassi Pathana, where she additionally earns 9000-10000/ per month. Thus she is earning about Rs 20000 per month. Navjot works as stitching instructor and earns Rs 8000 per month. A third former trainee, Manpreet Kaur, has opened Kaur boutique in Bassi Pathania & earns Rs15000-20000/ per month. They were all full of pride for all that they had achieved.
- 6) Another success story is that of Sanjana, who passed out in 2022 from Mehr Baba Charitable Trust, District Fatehgarh Sahib and has started her own salon, Anmol Hair Makeup & Extension Studio, in Ludhiana. She provides beauty services and also takes classes. Her average monthly earning is about Rs 15000/. It was her belief that the course enhanced her skills, boosted her confidence and helped her become financially independent and self-reliant.
- 7) Ms. Megha received training in Skin & Health Care from All India Women Conference, Batala in the year 2011. She worked as a free-lancer for a couple of years. After her marriage, her husband's family established a saloon for her named 'Money Shall Saloon' on Jalandhar Road, Batala. With her dedication she made it such a success that her current earning is about thirty

thousand per month. She has employed four girls to assist her. At the same time, she takes 3-4 girls as trainees in her Saloon.

- 8) Ms. Anuradha attended the Skin and Hair Care Beauty course from October, 21 to March, 22 with Shingar NGO at Pathankot. Now she runs her own parlour named Anuradha Makeover. She has three employees and earns about 25,000/- per month. She also takes classes for such courses and gives live demos.
- 9) Ms. Monika has undergone the six months training in Skin and Hair Care in the year 2024 organized by the NGO. Lala Hari Chand Bhalla Technical Educational Welfare, Jalandhar. After competition of the training she has opened a beauty parlour and has engaged two girls too for assistance. Presently she is earning Rs. 20,000/- per month from this parlour. And she earns more during festival seasons.
- 10) Ms. Amandeep Kaur has undergone six months training in cutting and Tailoring in the year 2024 organized by the NGOI Lala Hari Chand Bhalla Technical Educational Welfare, Jalandhar. After completion of the training, she has opened her own boutique at nala road Jalandhar and is able to earn 7000-8000/- per month. There are many more such instances.

III. SOSVA AS FIELD NGO

Education: SOSVA has been implementing the project of remedial coaching for weak students at primary level in District Mohali since 2014-15 as Field NGO. Weak students studying in Class 3 in Government Schools are imparted free coaching for two hours immediately after school hours in the School premises. Most of the students belong to poorer families whose parents are not sufficiently educated to be able to help them in their studies. About 12 to 16 students are enrolled in each centre (average of 15) so that the teacher can pay individual attention to each student. Teachers, preferably with ETT or higher qualification (or 10 Plus 2 with teaching experience) are engaged on a monthly honorarium of Rs. 2200/- p.m. since increased to Rs 2500/- The students enrolled in the centre are given test by the teachers at the time of enrolment to determine their learning level in different subjects. They are given monthly tests to assess the extent of improvement. At the end of the project, a test is administered to students on the basis of a uniform paper to assess their progress.

HIV/AIDS: Two projects, funded by Punjab State AIDS Control Society, are being implemented by SOSVA at Phagwara, Distt. Kapurthala.

IV. Deputation of Interns

Institutions for training in management and public administration are required to depute their students to the reputed NGOs for familiarizing them with working of the NGO sector.

NIMMS, Mumbai has been sponsoring students to SOSVA from the Institute for the last few years for internship. This year they had deputed one student from 27th January, 2025 to 19th February, 2025. Department of Public Administration, Panjab University deputed 6 students for internship from 5th June to July, 2025. These students were acquainted with the functioning of SOSVA as mother-NGO and working of various field NGOs supported by SOSVA. The student from NIMMS was also given exposure to the project of HIV/AIDS for injecting drug users being implemented by SOSVA as NGO.

Such internships give SOSVA a deep sense of satisfaction that the voluntary services which they are quietly discharging have been found worthy of study by interns of prestigious institutions.

V. Meeting of Governing Body and AGM.

Meeting of Governing Body and AGM were held on 20.08.2024.

VI. STAFF

SOSVA Office: Monitoring of projects along with Chairman/Member Directors and follow-up of their implementation was done by a team of three dedicated Programme Managers - Sh. Vijay Kumar Sharma, Ms. Saroj Bala and Sh. Parmod Sobti. Sh Sadhu Ram PA provided excellent secretarial support. Besides, a driver and an office help have been engaged.

HIV/AIDS: Two Project Managers with complementary staff of two Monitoring & Evaluation Officers, an Accountant, six Outreach Workers and two GNMs have been engaged for implementing Targeted Intervention projects for HIV/AIDS among CSWs and MSMs and for IDUs in Phagwara.

PROGRAMMES IMPLEMENTED DURING 2024-25 AS MOTHER NGO

I. SOCIAL SECURITY

Women Empowerment Projects

Objective: The main objective of these projects is to empower poor women by imparting useful skills, which would help them to contribute to the family's income.

Imparting Skills to Women: Projects are sanctioned for training of poor women in Cutting & Tailoring, Hair & Skin Care, Computer Operations, and Home Care of Elderly and Critically Sick Persons. While identifying specific skills for which training is to be imparted in a particular area, due consideration is given to the following:

- (a) Whether identified trainees can acquire specific skill.
- (b) Whether similar training has already been imparted in the area or its vicinity in the recent past.
- (c) Whether it will be possible for the trainees to gainfully utilize the training for securing employment, including piece rate work and self-employment.

Eligibility. The NGOs are advised that at least 80% of the trainees should be from poorer families such as those below poverty line, SCs, Blue Card holders (under subsidized atta dal scheme of the State Government), widows, divorced women and those from low-income occupations like landless agricultural workers, construction labour, brick kiln labour, unskilled factory workers, domestic servants, hawkers, rickshaw pullers etc.

Conduct. Training is given in two batches of six months duration One batch normally comprises 25 women. Training is imparted by qualified instructors for four hours a day, six days a week. On completion of the course, trainees are got examined by ITI trained teachers.

Gainful Employment. NGOs are required to help the trainees after completion of their training to secure employment to enable them to contribute to their family income. The target set for the NGOs is that at least 70% of the trainees should be able to contribute to their family income through direct employment, piece-rate work or self-employment within 6 months of completion of training. To enable trainees to secure gainful employment/ self-employment, the syllabi are based on requirement of the market. Interaction with prospective employers is also arranged by the NGO either by inviting them to meet the trainees or taking trainees to their establishments leading to on-the-job training during the last month. This enables them to learn about dealing with customers and other practical aspects of work. NGO's are also advised to help those who wish to set up their own parlour/boutique get loan under Mudra or other schemes.

Sewing Machines & Start-up Kits. The women having received training in Cutting & Tailoring are

provided sewing machines costing about Rs 2100/- and those having been trained in Skin & Hair Care, are given kits worth Rs.1,500/- to help them in utilizing their training gainfully without loss of time.

Creating Awareness against Drug Addiction

Objective of the scheme is to sensitize college students and students in 8th class and above in schools against drug addiction. Awareness is created through lectures, plays, songs, puppet shows, debates, declamation contests and rallies etc.

Social Security Projects Implemented during 2024-25

The Apex Committee on NGOs in its meeting held on 19.02.2024 allocated an amount of Rs.76.40 Lacs out of budget grant for the year 2023-24 for the programmes of Deptt. Of Social Security Women & Child Department.

In all 99 projects were implemented including 10 projects with funds provided by HPCL Mittal Foundation & 9 from donations.

The Apex Committee on NGOs, in its meeting held on 12th November 2024, allocated an amount of Rs 179 lakhs out of Budget Grant 2024-25 for the Projects of Social Security, Women & Child Development to be implemented through SOSVA (N) Punjab. HPCL-Mittal Foundation (Bathinda Refinery) provided Rs. 7 Lacs for implementation of 07 projects for training in Cutting & Tailoring & Skin & Hair Care.

Ninety-nine Projects have been implemented during the year. (**80** projects have been implemented from Govt grant. **10** out of CSR grant from HPCL Mittal foundation and **9** out of donations.) Out of these **99** projects, **52** are for training in Cutting & Tailoring, **40** in Skin & Hair Care, **2** in Computer Application & **5** in Care for Elderly & Sick Persons.

Besides, **94** are under implementation at close of the year which include **87** projects from Govt grant and **7** projects from CSR grant from HPCL Mittal Foundation. Out of these **94** Projects, 43 are for training in Cutting & Tailoring,**40** in Skin & Hair care **07** in Computer Application & **04** in care for Elderly & Sick persons.

With the implementation of 99 projects about 2500 women, mostly from poor families will receive training in various skills and with the completion of 94 projects under implementation 2300 women will get training in these skills.

The objective of the schemes for training of women in various skills is to enable women from poor families to contribute to their family income. According to the information received from the NGOs, in the first batch of training for the period 01.01.25 to 30.06.25 more than 48% of the trainees belonged to scheduled castes. Including other poor women such as those belonging to BPL families or other low income occupations, almost 100% of the trainees were from poor families.

NGOs implementing these projects are required to help the trainees to utilize their training for supplementing their family income by securing job, opening of boutiques/parlours or self-employment. They are required to report after 3 months of completion of training the extent of employment including self-employment secured by the trainees. The information supplied in respect of training programmes implemented during 2023-24 shows about 75% of those trainees who have completed the training have secured employment including self-employment and thus started contributing to their family income. Out of these about 300 have secured jobs and 86 has set up their own boutiques or parlours.

In respect of the projects for awareness against drug addiction among students of Secondary & Senior Secondary Schools and Colleges out of budget 2024-25, 7 projects for implementation have been sanctioned from 01.08.2025 to 31.01.2026 after which the students get busy with the preparation for final exam.

The awareness against drug addition will be imparted to about 12000 students.

II. REPRODUCTIVE AND CHILD HEALTH PROGRAMME

General

The programme is implemented mainly in slums and areas inhabited by the poor where major health indicators are below the State average.

Objective

The main objective of the Reproductive and Child Health Programme is to supplement the efforts of the State Government to improve health status of the poorer sections and in particular:

- (a) To improve the health status of pregnant women and reduce maternal mortality.
- (b) To improve the health status of children up to 6 years age and reduce infant and child mortality.
- (c) To improve the health status of adolescent girls and sensitizing them about menstrual hygiene.

- (d) To improve health of general population by creating awareness regarding nutrition, personal hygiene & sanitation, and harmful effects of intoxicants.
- (e) To create awareness regarding major non-communicable diseases and promoting annual medical check-up of persons above 30 years of age for timely detection of any major disease and to provide improvement in health of the elderly.
- (f) To promote use of Ayurveda for improvement in general health status.
- (g) To improve the sex ratio by discouraging female foeticide and removing bias against female child in regard to nutrition, medical care and education.

For achieving the above objectives, NGOs work in close coordination with field staff of the concerned departments viz ANMs, ASHA workers and Anganwadi workers.

Role of NGOs

NGOs have an important role in:

- (a) Creating awareness for behavioral change on various issues regarding health of pregnant women, adolescent girls, young children, lactating mothers and others from poorer sections of society through group discussions and visits to households.
- (b) Persuading and, when necessary, helping targeted population to take benefit of Government schemes for:
 - Control of anemia among pre-school children, school going children, out of school adolescent girls and lactating mothers.
 - Use of calcium & Iron tablets by pregnant women and lactating mothers.
 Supplementary nutrition for pre-school children, pregnant women and lactating mothers.
 - iii. Cash benefits for institutional delivery to women from SCs and BPL families
 - iv. Cash benefit to pregnant women and lactating mothers with no living child.
 - v. Free treatment to eligible householders up to Rs 5 Lacs per Annum and to senior citizen above 70 years age up to Rs 5 Lac in addition.
- (c) Persuading pregnant women to undergo check up by the doctor during pregnancy and persuading persons above 30 years of age to avail of free Annual Medical Check-up.
- (d) Persuading pregnant women and other intended beneficiaries to attend outreach camps organized by the Health Department in their area.
- (e) Creating awareness against female foeticide and discrimination against female child in medical care, education and nutrition.
- (f) Organizing camps for promoting use of Ayurvedic treatment and home-based remedies with the help of Ayurvedic doctors from the district.

Training

Training workshops are organized for field worker of NGOs initialy for conducting Base Line Survey and there after for imparting instructions regarding implementation of the programme.

IEC Material

IEC material in the form of booklets, posters, pamphlets and flexes etc., for various components of the programme, for use by field workers and distribution among beneficiaries is supplied to the NGOs.

Implementation of RCH Projects out of Budget Grant 2024-25

Four RCH Projects as per list at Annexure 3, were implemented out of budget grant 2023-24 during the period Istth July 2024 to 28th February 2025. These have resulted in improvement in key health indicators in slum areas covered by these projects. The Apex Committee in its meeting held on 12th November 2024, allocated an amount of Rs 25 lakhs out of Budget Grant 2024-25. Six RCH projects & One project for Home Care for Elderly & Sick Persons as per list at Annexure 4have been sanctioned out of this amount and their implementation started from Istth April 2025 for 11 months period.

PROGRAMMES IMPLEMENTED DURING 2024-25 AS FIELD NGO

I. FREE COACHING FOR WEAK STUDENTS AT PRIMARY LEVEL

The Apex Committee in its meeting held on 12th November 2024, allocated an amount of Rs 21 lakhs out of Budget Grant 2024-25 for running remedial class for weak students of class 3 & 5 in Mohali Distt. The project will be implemented from 01.07.2025 to 31.01.2026.

II. HIV/AIDS PROJECT

Punjab State AIDS Control Society (PSAC) sanctioned Grant in Aid for two projects at Phagwara during 2024-25, which were implemented during the year.

- (a) Rs. 26,56,840/- for Targeted Intervention Project for Female Sex Workers (FSW) and Male Sex Workers (MSM)
- (b) Rs. 30,76,412/- for Targeted Intervention Project for IDUs (Injecting Drug Users). Service was provided to 745 FSWs against a target of 600 active FSWs. Against the target of 300 MSMs, 349 were taken on roll and were provided necessary services. In addition, 144 Transgenders were given services against the target of 100. The target for the year for IDUs was 800 again which 875 were registered.
